








Terms Paradox: Definition

Terms are CRUCIAL





Finding out what terms the person uses and then using their language is a primary way of conveying respect and openness. Terms tell you none of what you need to know to provide appropriate services.

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Gender Identity

 An individual's internal sense of being male, female, something in between, or any other gender (not necessarily visible to others).



- Everyone has a gender identity!
- There are hundreds of gender identities

Gender Expression

 Gender expression is how a person expresses their gender through clothing, grooming, speech, hair style, body language, social interactions, and other behaviors.



 We ALL make choices about how much effort we put forth to follow these societal norms



Clarity: Trans-feminine




Clarity: Trans-masculine




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Language: "I don't get it!"

- Reality: There isn't a list of "right" or "wrong" language or behaviors




























Rates of Incarceration




Why are trans people incarcerated at higher rates?

- Bullying
- Dropping out of school
- Childhood abuse/neglect
- Family or community rejection
- Employment discrimination
- Widespread harassment and discrimination
- Underground economy

Discrimination and Abuse of Trans People in Custody

- Gender-segregated arrest procedures
- Denied access to hormones and other trans-specific healthcare
- Increased sexual violence, harassment, and abuse



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The prison personnel seemed obsessed with making me a man. They denied me a razor so I could have a "manly" beard. They beleaguered me with gender and sexual slurs, and chanted "mister" at me. They constantly told me that I have a penis, while calling me John.

Sexual Abuse of Transgender Inmates



of transgender women in California state prisons reported sexual abuse compared to 4% of non-transgender men

Dynamics

- Demeaning language
- Sexual harassment
- Abusive or inappropriate searches
- Protective pairing
- Sexual assault
- Prostitution

As a bisexual transgender woman incarcerated in men's prisons, I have always been extremely vulnerable to sexual assault. The sexual assaults took place in the showers, my cell, other inmate's cells, a basement, a laundry room, and a grievance office. I reported very few of the attacks for fear of what would happen to me if I did.







The Choices

- Gender Expression
- · Hormones and medical care
- · Names, pronouns, and language



Helping Survivors: Names and Pronouns

- Listen carefully
- Reflect what you hear
- Ask all survivors about their preferred name
- Ask about pronouns if you are unsure
- Remember that it may take time to trust
- Check where it is safe to use a chosen name and pronoun





Respect and Validate

- Believe that the survivor is the expert in their own experience
- Validate the survivor's identity
- Be consistent





Helping Survivors

- Make it clear that your services are for trans survivors
- Empower survivors to make their own choices
- Give clear information
- Ask survivors what they need



Helping Survivors

- Check in about language
- Follow the survivor's lead
- Consider all medical needs

- Be careful about consent and assumptions

Tips for Advocates

- · Simple actions can have a big impact
- Treat the survivor as a whole person
- Listen carefully and ask only those questions that are relevant and necessary
- Show compassion, persistence, and kindness




